The Scrooge's school is rundown and neglected which reflects how Scrooge was neglected by his father.	Stave 3 The Ghost of Christmas Present shows Scrooge people having a positive experience of Christmas including the Cratchits, Fred and several people in unpleasant experiences. Weather is cold and foggy symbolising how there is a problem in society.	Stave 4 The Ghost of Christmas Yet to Come shows Scrooge a future where both Tiny Tim and Scrooge are dead. Scrooge learns the message that unless something changes then Tiny Tim will die. The ghost is silent, slow and unpredictable which symbolises how death comes when we least expect it	Stave 5 Scrooge wakes up on Christmas morning laughing and happy. He buys the Cratchits a turkey and visits his nephew, Fred. Weather is sunny and bright symbolising a positive and optimistic future.
